: TURNING SYNTAX INTO SENSE



PITRU PAKSHA

In 2025, Shraddha Paksha began on September 7 and concludes on September 21 with Sarvapitri Amavasya.

Shraddha Paksha, also known as Pitru Paksha or Mahalaya, is a 16-lunar-day period in Hinduism dedicated to honoring one's ancestors (Pitrus). It is considered a deeply sacred time to remember and offer gratitude to departed loved ones, helping their souls find peace and liberation.

The rituals performed during this time are rooted in the ancient scriptures of Sanatan Dharma, with references found in texts like the Brahma Purana and Garuda Purana. By performing these rites with full faith, devotees can settle ancestral karmic debts and receive the blessings of their forefathers.



There are various rituals and practices that are followed during these days:

Shraddha: A ritual performed by the head male member of the family, typically the eldest son, though other family members may also participate. The ceremony is meant to invite the souls of deceased ancestors to receive offerings.

Tarpan: This involves offering water mixed with black sesame seeds, rice, and barley to the ancestors to satiate their spiritual thirst.

Pind Daan: Food offerings, usually rice balls (pindas), are made to the ancestors. These offerings are believed to help the souls in their journey.

Charity and feeding: Giving food, clothing, and dakshina (monetary gifts) to Brahmins and the needy is considered a meritorious act that pleases the ancestors. Food is also offered to animals like cows and crows.

Lord Vishnu is worshipped on these days particularly because as per some beliefs, praying to Lord Vishnu during this period is believed to help ancestors achieve salvation.

There are various observations that can be seen these days. Auspicious events are avoidedAs Shraddha Paksha is a time of spiritual solemnity, many families avoid scheduling major celebrations like weddings or buying new property during this period.

Importance of Mahalaya Amavasya: The final day of the fortnight is called Mahalaya Amavasya or Sarvapitri Amavasya. This day is particularly significant for performing rites for all ancestors, especially those whose death anniversaries may have been forgotten.

Offerings on Mahalaya Amavasya .On Mahalaya Amavasya, one can perform rites for all departed relatives, regardless of their specific death anniversary.

The Ten Virtues of Dasalakshana: Paryushana Parva

Paryushana Parva is the most important annual festival for Shwetambara Jains, a period dedicated to self-purification, introspection, and spiritual upliftment. This sacred festival lasts for eight days, typically falling in the Hindu month of Bhadrapada (August or September). Core Observances- During Paryushana,

devotees intensify their spiritual practices. The core focus is on observing the five great vows of Jainism: non-violence (Ahi msa), truth (Satya), nonstealing (Asteya), celibacy (Brahmacharya), and non possession (Aparigraha) Many Jains undertake various forms of fasti ng (Upavasa), rangi ng from partial fasts to complete abstinen ce from food and wa ter. Daily activities include attending temple lectures, me ditating (Samayika), and studying scriptu res, particularly the Ka lpa Sutra, which recou nts the life of Lord Mah avira. Samvatsari and Forgiveness- The eighth and final day of the festival is known as Samvatsari. It is the most significant day, re served for the ritual of universal forgiveness. Devotees perform a special penitential retreat called Sam vatsari Pratikraman a to reflect on their action over the past year and repent for their sins. The festival culminates with the heartfelt plea of "Michhami Dukkadam." This Prakrit phrase translates to "may all the evil that has been done be fruitless," signifying a request for forgiveness from all living beings for any harm caused, knowingly or unknowingly. Paryushana Parva, known within the **Digambar** Jain tradition as Dasalakshana Parva, stands as the community's most important spiritual festival. This ten-day observance is a period of intense austerity, contemplation, and self-purification. The name Dasalakshana itself means "Ten Virtues," as the festival's structure is built around the daily contemplation and practice of

> one of these core principles. The festival guides a devotee on a path to cleanse the soul of accumulated karma. Each day is dedicated to a specific virtue: Uttam Kshama (Supreme Forgiveness), Uttam Mardava (Supreme Humility), Uttam Arjava (Supreme Straightforwardness), Uttam Shaucha (Supreme Purity), Uttam Satya

> > (Supreme Self-Restraint), Uttam Tapa (Supreme Austerity), Uttam Tyaga (Supreme Renunciation), Uttam Akinchanya

This is followed by Kshamavani, or Forgiveness Day, where individuals seek pardon from all living beings by saying "Uttam Kshama" for any harm caused, knowingly or unknowingly, over the past year.
