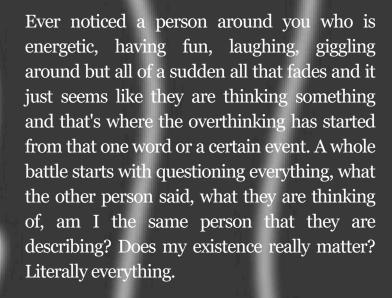
High Functioning DISORDER

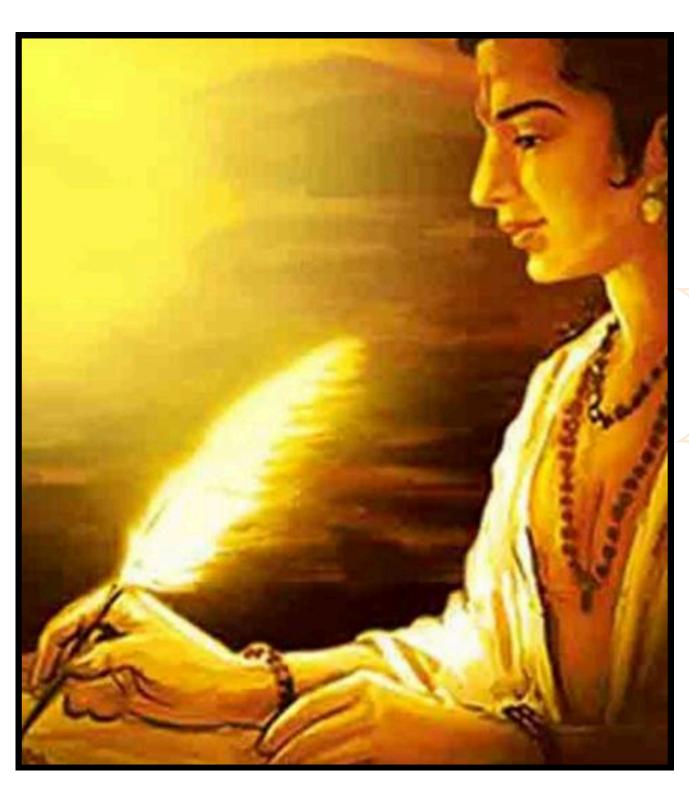

The session concluded with all participants pledging to lead healthy, drug-free lives.

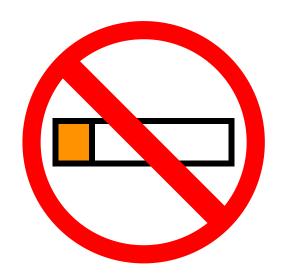

GURANTEE OR TYRANNY?

his year, the budget is filled with strategic provisions aimed at increasing the agricultural sector, introducing innovative employment programs, and providing strong financial support for MSMEs. We will uncover its implications for investors and traders as we navigate through this budget's intricacies; and learn how to adapt to the changing financial market.

The key highlights are:

The Union Budget 2024-25 has unveiled grand investments in job creation by means of employment, education and agriculture. Over the next five years, a ₹2 lakh crore initiative will create 41 million job opportunities. Further on, there is ₹1.48 lakh crore which has been allocated towards developing education as well as skill enhancement plans. Agriculture gets ₹1.52 lakh crore for high-yielding climateresilient crops and natural farming with initiatives to enhance pulse-oilseed self-sufficiency.

Taxation of buybacks:

Earlier Shareholders were entitled to tax-free buyback proceeds while companies had to pay tax at rate of 20% on that amount. This mechanism indirectly impacted shareholders as it increased costs overall for buybacks. Under the new budget proposal however, starting from October 1st 2024 firms shall no longer be taxed on their buybacks anymore.

Some other significant changes are:

As regards getting rid of the 20% TDS on repurchase of mutual fund units it is aimed at simplifying the tax deduction structure. Besides, abolishing the Angel Tax will benefit investors in startups since those taxes apply on the amounts raised in excess of fair market value by unlisted companies' shares. While stock investors and traders are adjusting their strategies following these policy modifications there is a tool which people can use to help them adjust their investment patterns called stockgro developed by Ajay Lakhotia who has experience when it comes to investment management during periods of transformations.
